I looked forward to the start of 2020 with a mixture of excitement topped off with a large helping of nerves. Planning was in hand, and everything was set for an exciting year. Disaster - Covid 19 struck, it was all so disappointing, the golfing year was in tatters. After a long period of lockdown, we just about managed to hold the Autumn meeting at College Pines in a carefully modified way.

### Results

Next came the County Waltz which was well organised by Audrey MacMillan and took place at Oakmere. We were very well looked after at Oakmere and able to enjoy a good meal there. Happily, the weather was excellent as we had to eat outside and it would have taken a lot to dampen the spirits of all the ladies who were at last able to play a county comp. The County Waltz was won by Charlie Hall, Sue Brownson and Wendy Stretch of Southwell were in first place with a score of 71.

The Spring Meeting and County Championships were held at Hollinwell, once again the weather was kind except for one very spiteful storm during the knockout matches. We were still under Covid 19 restrictions and so the Clubhouse remained shut during the championships. Despite this, the event ran smoothly thanks to a lot of hard work going on in the background. Our thanks go to Hollinwell for making us so welcome also to Maureen Clarke for advising on the course set up and organising the referees. More assistance was provided by Lady Captain Pauline Tillcock, her army of spotters and Audrey MacMillan.

This was the first event incorporating the World Handicapping System which did throw up a few challenges, but we got there in the end! Our County Champion was Libby Kilbride of Notts Ladies who beat Lauren Spray also of Notts Ladies in the final. Libby is now in the America at Jacksonville State University on a golf scholarship, and we wish her well.

Also of note was the exceptional Friday morning round played by Maddy Smith of Norwood Park who broke the course record with a gross 67. What a fabulous achievement.

The Coronation Cups took place on a pleasant day at Southwell Golf Course where we were made very welcome. This is an unusual course with the front nine inside the racecourse followed by a back nine with some very tricky greens. By this time Covid restrictions were easing, and we were allowed to experience some hospitality at this club as well. The winners of this event were Margaret Thorpe and Karen Donnelly of Ruddington Grange with a great score of 41.

The Notts Girls Championships took place at Wollaton on the 30<sup>th</sup> May taking the honours were Maddy Smith, Lexi Williams-Green of The Nottinghamshire, Libby Kilbride, and Elizabeth Wilson of Norwood Park. It has been said before but, we are fortunate that in this small county we have such emerging talent.

Then onto County Week which this year was held at Hinckley Golf Club in Leicestershire. The Leicestershire County committee worked very hard to put on a safe event and the organisation was excellent, the course was in great condition and presented a tough challenge for all the players.

I didn't think I'd ever be saying how nice it is to be speaking to a room full of expectant faces, but after our difficult spell away, it's lovely to be here in front of you all!

It was an interesting and enjoyable 2<sup>nd</sup> Team Campaign. A little bit stressful at times getting the teams sorted, largely due to a compressed fixture list and later in the summer people finally being allowed to travel. I'm reliably told it was ever thus, so maybe the stress wasn't any worse than it is every season!

## Results:

- i. 18th July. v Leicestershire at Lingdale lost 6.5 2.5 exceptionally hot, an achievement just playing! A sterling effort from all concerned
- ii. 21st July v Leicestershire at Beeston lost 7 2 marked the debut of our youngest player, 11 year old Millie Marsh (Beeston member) Stole the show, Leicestershire wanted to take her home with them!
- iii. 3rd August v Lincolnshire at Norwood. lost. 5.5 3.5 close match, could have gone either way
- iv. 18th August. v Lincolnshire at Ashby Decoy lost. 5.5 3.5 very long day, grateful for players travelling, but such a good team atmosphere.

The results don't quite tell an accurate story. Although we lost all of the matches, the games were mostly extremely close, well-fought affairs, often finishing on the 17<sup>th</sup> or 18<sup>th</sup>. Throughout, our players battled hard and played some excellent golf, always with a fantastic sporting spirit. This year we had 10 debutants, and a total of 17 players from 9 different clubs took part over the four matches. While this had its drawbacks, perhaps lessening our consistency, it had the huge benefit of introducing new, keen players to the squad, thus deepening our pool for future seasons. Hopefully we will have gained lots of valuable experience!

Special mention to Bernie Barton from The Nottinghamshire who was an absolute stalwart for the team. She played in every match, but not only that was almost always sent out first. She was our Mrs Reliable but also Mrs Cheerful, thank you Bernie. You really were a fantastic asset to the team.

Next year things will hopefully be more normal, making planning easier. We aim to hold some training/practice sessions before the start of the season, ideally involving potential first and second team players, and including appropriate juniors where possible. We will need to coordinate with the Junior organisers so that our respective sessions complement each other. Watch this space.

As you know, the second team serves partly as a training ground for potential first team players, helping them gain valuable experience of team match play; but another reason we put energy into it is to provide an incentive for keen competitive players who may never quite aspire to the first team...maybe clubs can forward us the names of any of their members - approx single figures - who might be interested? I'm pretty confident that those who played this year relished it. (If they didn't, they're very good actors!)

I have thoroughly enjoyed running the team this season. It's been a real pleasure for me, and I'm sure for Caron too, to support the team from the side-lines. I'd really like to thank Caron for all her help. She is a wonderfully calm presence, very plain speaking, super-organised and also good fun. These days are long, so let me tell you, that is important! I'd also like to thank the Notts host clubs, Beeston and Norwood, who both made us so welcome and couldn't do enough for us. ## 7. Treasurer's report – Jenny Smith

Lady President, County Captain, and members of the Association our accounts display a very satisfactory year, and I don't think a year ago we could have predicted such a successful year. I have included the figures for the year 2019 to enable a more realistic comparison of our spending this year. Most of the figures are self-explanatory but I will give some explanations where it will make the income and expenditure clearer.

## Affiliation Fees

We increased the affiliation fees from £8 to £9.50 in 2019 in line with the decision made in 2017 to bring our membership fees in line with the NUGC. Because of the circumstances we have kept the fees at that level for the past two years. This year the number of lady playing members in the county has increased by 68 ladies and juniors by 28 although this latter figure is in doubt as juniors do not pay an affiliation fee and can be a member of more than one club. Could this possibly be a rare positive side effect of the Covid epidemic? Going forward the Executive Committee has decided to leave the fees as they are for 2021/22 ie £9.50. We will resume payment of team fees in 2022. The £60 shown was for clubs who did not make the payment in 2020. For your information the England Golf fees are also to stay the same ie £9.50 for the coming financial year.

## **County Competitions**

I think the numbers for County Meetings reflected in the income are very promising despite the slow start we had due to all the restrictions. In the coming year we hope to plan for payment online for those who wish to use it. Hopefully this will help everyone and save regular trips to the bank.

### **County Week**

The expenses for county week are considerably less than in 2019 due mainly to good housekeeping from the County and Vice-Captains. Also, the location of Hinckley Golf Club meant far lower travelling expenses. However, the reclaiming of money for cancelled rooms from Premier Inn hotels has proved to have a very high slope rating! After 15 weeks of phone calls and emails the sum of £177 has been paid into the bank but sadly not in time to appear in this year's accounts.

### Juniors

The Junior Section has again profited from a donation from The Tasker Trophy competition. We are extremely grateful for this donation and would encourage every club to enter the competition. The Notts Golf Partnership through England Golf Development has again given us £1345 for junior coaching but unfortunately it came too late to feature in this year's accounts. Sadly, the main money earner, the mixed event earlier in the year, was cancelled so I think overall the junior section have financially managed very well.

We do envisage higher costs next year, to include more overnight stays for senior and junior teams. The venues for some of the matches involve over 90 minutes travelling time and to play 2 rounds of golf after that starting at 8.30am is a difficult ask.

## **USGA Payments**

There have been no ratings of courses this year and the £200 was for a course rated in 2020.

## President's Day

The expenses shown for this competition are in the main for the payback of competition fees refunded after cancellation of the event last year. This year's figures will be reflected in next year's balance sheet. I can say however it looks possible that this year's event made a profit of just over £1000 which is used to help county teams throughout the year.

### Expenses

A large proportion of expenses have been spent on insurance, website fees, a new computer and software to allow us to install all the necessary information for the World Handicapping System and again trophy engraving and repairs, and I think you will agree looking at the trophies that this money has been well spent. We are still awaiting the bill for this year's engraving and renovations.

As you are probably aware from the advertising on the website I have decided to 'retire' from the role of treasurer. So now the County do need someone to volunteer to take over as Treasurer and I would once again appeal to all of you here to ask at your clubs if there is a willing person to take over this role. We need someone who is interested in joining the team, who can run an Excel spreadsheet and take over the running of the finances of the

Association. It does not take up huge amounts of time, it's a great way of being part of County Golf and I would highly recommend it. So please can you encourage any likely members of your own clubs or indeed anyone here today to contact me for more information.

I would like to express my thanks to Sue Northridge, the auditor who is also stepping down, for her help with the auditing of the accounts these past 8 years and to wish her well in the coming year as Lady Captain at BFGC.

I took on the role of treasurer from Helen Maber, a tough act to follow, not having a lot of background in accounts. However, I thought to myself and to quote Dr Seuss 'you have brains in your head, feet in your shoes and you can steer yourself in any direction you choose.' So, after 7 years of steering Excel spreadsheets, I can honestly say how much I have learnt and enjoyed being part of a team and would like to thank the County Captains, Presidents and members of the Executive Committees past and present for their unerring support but mostly for their friendship.

## 10. Midland North Representative's report – Clare Jones

I am delighted to present my report for 2021. I will begin with the individual MNR competitions played in 2021. There were two highlights to the season for those representing the county, the first of these being Elizabeth Wilson's success in winning the England Medal Finals at Woodhall Spa. I was fortunate to be able to witness at first hand her winning round at the regional final at Belton Park - I hasten to add I was caddying and not playing - I was impressed with her calm and mature approach to her golf and wish Elizabeth every success as she continues her golfing journey.

Secondly, I have also to congratulate, Josie Connolly and Penny Richardson of Ruddington Grange GC, who represented the county and the region at the Australian Spoons national final. Josie and Penny won the regional final on their home course and although we always talk of having home advantage it is not always easy to turn this

into a win. Josie and Penny reported back on how much they had enjoyed their experience at the national final where they came a very creditable third. I must also thank Ruddington Grange for their support in hosting the regional final, the club staff, Lady Captain, Ginny and the ladies could not have been more helpful and welcoming and I received very positive feedback on the day and after the competition.

The Queen of Clubs competition was held at Mickleover GC and was won by Ellise Ryder from Lincolnshire. Lucy Moorhouse representing Ruddington Grange came third, just missing out on second place on count back and Vicki Johnson from The Nottinghamshire was also in the gross prize list.

As the England Golf Voting Member for NCLGA I have continued to represent the county and participate in national discussions as England Golf moved swiftly to regular online meetings and updates during the pandemic. I have also represented the region on the Independent Golfer Working party and continue to do so following the launch of the IG scheme in July. Before the scheme details were finalised I Chaired an online meeting for county representatives from the region with senior staff from England Golf, including the Chief Executive Jeremy Tomlinson. The discussion and Q&A session was I believe useful and allowed us to ask a range of questions about the IG initiative.

Alongside the continuing development and focus on the WHS, which Val will report on in more detail, England Golf also remain committed to the development of women and girls golf through initiatives such as Girls Golf Rocks, Women on Par and the Women in Golf Charter.

It is still a sobering fact that the average age of female club members is over 60, yet the interest in golf especially once females have "had a go" through taster sessions or coaching academies is out there. Our Club Support Officer, Emily Rowbottom, is here today and I am sure would be very happy to talk to any of you about how she can help your section and club to grow the women's game.

Safegolf accreditation remains a very important priority, especially given some of the issues in this area being faced by other sports. There are 14 clubs in the county still to achieve full accreditation. If your club is in this position please do encourage them to complete this vitally important accreditation.

As we emerge from the challenges of the last two years I can also announce that with the agreement of the County President and new County Captain I will be discussing with Emily, NCLGA becoming a signatory to the Women in Golf Charter, and will be reporting back to the Executive on this at its next meeting.

Thank you for your support for MNR events during the last year, my regional colleagues and I have greatly appreciated the efforts made by clubs to reschedule competitions and send players to our competitors. We look forward to seeing you in 2022

## 11. County handicap adviser's report – Val Dowthwaite

The WHS is now well and truly embedded in the running of our clubs.

It has been a steep learning curve for us all, but I have been kept well informed of updates by EG which I have been able to forward to handicap secretaries as bedtime reading.

Acceptable Score Submissions for Handicap Purposes are to be encouraged but golfers must ensure they comply with Rule 2 of the WHS Rules of Handicapping. They must declare their intent to submit a score via the EG App, or via the relevant process defined at the club where the round will be played. They should follow the Rules of Golf, play over a tee set with a current CR and SR and in an authorised format of play, over a minimum number of holes.

A committee may accept a score which was not pre-registered if all other criteria has been met. Players should be reminded that an electronic return of a score has the same status as a physical scorecard and the score must be verified by the marker as soon as possible after play. Any player who uses acceptable scores for the purpose of manipulating their HI will be subject to disciplinary action by the club.

There are concerns regarding the large number of Unsatisfied Score Intents being created by players. These could be down to user error/lack of understanding or disregard for the system, but players should be made aware that all score intents should be satisfied and those players not complying, could be subject to Penalty Scores.

Penalty scores are applicable where a score is incomplete, a player persistently fails to return an appropriate score, or handicap manipulation is suspected.

There are very detailed Guidance Notes on the application of Penalty scores on the EG website together with some interesting FAQs which I recommend to you as further bedtime reading.

The more information a player includes on a scorecard, the better, but a player would be disqualified if the CH was omitted. It is also important to remember to play to the CH and not the PH as the Adjusted Gross Score can be affected, particularly in Par, Bogey and Stableford competitions, if a player picks up too soon.

During winter months there are various situations such as course conditions and maintenance plans where holes may be closed and declared out of play. In these circumstances, the committee may decide to declare some holes out of play and could also still have a requirement for up to 2 temporary greens. These scores continue to be acceptable for handicap purposes – the golfer would follow rule 3.2 of the Rules of Handicapping, 'When a Hole is not Played', with the software calculating and awarding an adjusted gross score accordingly.

A 'Hole Not Played' is only to be used in an unavoidable circumstance. It is not a choice available to the player if it is raining or they are not playing particularly well. A player may not just decide to walk in.

Circumstances where a 'Hole Not Played' may be used are as follows: work on a hole, hours of available light, becoming ill or injured or being called off the course in an emergency.

The returned scorecard should be processed using the actual scores achieved on the holes completed and designating those not played as 'not started'. This process will correctly allocate the required score for handicapping.

The EG Women's Medal is now awarded for the aggregate of the best 4 of any complete 18-hole competition score returned over the year. This report will be available on the Club Platform in January 2022. This is to enable those clubs who are holding acceptable score competitions throughout the whole year as EG recommend, to continue to do so and those scores be included in the result.

Should any club need an interim report for awarding an internal EG Medal Prize, this can only be found through the County WHS Platform. I can forward an interim result to a Club if needed for your own prize presentation.

The Handicap Review process, which should take place before the end of December, has been slightly amended this year. Only those players who are flagged up in the report on the EG Club Platform should be considered for review. There is however provision for reviewing players whose ability may have been affected by long term illness or injury or those who have been winning a disproportionate number of competitions which do not count for handicap.

It is assumed that players who return a reasonable number of acceptable scores should be correctly handicapped through their own averaged best score returns.

I have been asked whether competitions played with a restricted number of clubs are acceptable scores for handicap. Any score for handicap must be played under the Rules of Golf. As the Rules of Golf allow a player 14 clubs, any limit imposed by the competition committee makes that competition non-qualifying.

There will be no changes to the County Handicap Advisory Team for 2022. I will remain as County Handicap Advisor with Maureen Clarke as my assistant.

There will be a vacancy for Assistant Handicap Advisor at the end of 2022.

Thank you everyone for your queries during 2021; keep them coming and I will endeavour to respond as quickly and in as much detail as possible.

I would now like to invite Helen Maber Lead Course Assessment Officer, to address the meeting.

## USGA Course Rating Update – Helen Maber

When COVID hit in 2020, we had rated 31 of the 33 courses in Nottinghamshire. We were unable to carry out any ratings in 2020, so Leen Valley and Mansfield Woodhouse were given provisional ratings by England Golf. This allowed them to operate under the new WHS system until COVID allowed us to get out on the course again.

This year we have completed the rating of these final two courses, so now all Nottinghamshire courses have full USGA ratings compliant with the introduction of the new WHS system.

In addition, this year we have re-rated Trent Lock which had made significant changes to its course, ready for implementation at the beginning of the next playing season. This was the first of the county courses to be re-visited.

From now on, we are on a ten-year rolling programme to re-rate our courses, starting next year and we have formulated a rough plan to visit three or four courses each year in the order in which they were originally rated. This may be subject to change if we are approached by individual courses to bring forward their re-rating because of any significant changes to the course.

Rating is a labour-intensive job and I am very grateful once again to Jenny Smith who has proved an invaluable helper to me this year.
